Program Notes

Welcome to Concord Women's Chorus Winter Concert 2024: *The Harper's Song*. Today's concert is a pure celebration of voices and harp, cello, and violin, melody and flourish. Music that evokes memory, warmth, intelligence, joy. Today, I greet you, in the hope that our time together feels warm, seasonal, comforting, and ultimately joyous.

Despite conducting Britten's beloved cantata many times (in many voice configurations) over a multi-decade career, I never tire of its exquisite beauty, intelligence, and pure sentiment. *A Ceremony of Carols* is filled with humanity: dramatic, lyrical, clever, and economical. Ultimately, full of heart.

The work has a storied history. Benjamin Britten wrote the piece in 1942 while crossing the Atlantic aboard a Swedish cargo ship. He actually intended to use the month-long voyage to complete what would become his well-known Hymn to St. Cecilia, but the early sketches were confiscated by customs authorities who feared that the music was in fact a secret code. Britten left England at the outset of the war in 1939, and headed for the United States, where his fame grew quickly, and where, it must be noted, he was unlikely to be drafted into the British army. After several years abroad, he and his partner, the acclaimed tenor Peter Pears, returned home, embarking on this long sea voyage.

While in port in Nova Scotia, Britten came upon a little book, *The English Galaxy of Shorter Poems*, which became the source of the "carols." The carols are largely the product of 15th- and 16th-century writers, most of whom are anonymous. Britten maintained their authentically unique flavor by setting the original Middle English texts. *A Ceremony of Carols* consists of eight polyphonic settings; these eight carols are bookended by statements of the Gregorian chant "Hodie Christus Natus Est" ("Christ is born today"), and midway through the set is an astounding interlude for harp solo that features this same plainchant tune. The carols themselves show a remarkable diversity of styles, from the jubilant exultations of "Wolcum Yole" and "Deo Gracias," to the pastoral and lyrical "There is no rose" and "Balulalow," to the martial urgency of "This little Babe" and its ever-expanding canon. The piece is one haunting, vibrant, gorgeous, lovely, and meditative whole, marked by concision of composition and a rich, sophisticated harmonic palate. A truly beautiful and enduring canonical work.

The program offers a handful of other gorgeous works for the season, including Edward Henderson's theatrical, propulsive, and buoyant arrangement of the most famous Canadian Christmas carol, *The Huron*

Carol, oft cited as the earliest known North American indigenous carol. Elaine Hagenberg's *O Come*, *Emmanuel* is a treasured Advent hymn utterly reborn in this haunting new setting for women's voices, piano, and cello. *The Harper's Song* is composer David Conte's dreamy and lyrical setting of Adam Christensen's poem of the same name. The text imagines harps warming the winter night as a complex cello melody hearkens to an earlier age, imbued with mystery from the shifting tonality. Finally, to close our concert, we offer Dan Forrest's poignant and embracing *Shalom*, a simple but insistent call for peace and justice.

As always, the members of Concord Women's Chorus are grateful for the time you spend with us. May you find safety, joy, and sweetness in the company of loved ones, and may this season bring hope to your hearts.

Jane Ring Frank, Artistic Director

Jane Ring Frank is pleased to be in her 30th year as Artistic Director of the Concord Women's Chorus, a 50-voice ensemble based in Concord, Massachusetts. The chorus prides itself on rehearsing and performing challenging, new music written especially for women.

From professional CD recording projects to workshops for professional conductors and singers, Ms. Frank continues to direct some of Boston's best musical ensembles. For twelve years, she was the critically acclaimed Artistic Director and Founder of Boston Secession – one of Boston's premiere professional choral ensembles.



Ms. Frank began her conducting career at California State University, Long Beach, where she became associate conductor of the premiere 70-voice University Choir, staff pianist, lecturer, and musical director/conductor for the Department of Theatre Arts. She also worked as a *répétiteur* with professional opera companies in Los Angeles, including the Los Angeles Music Center Opera and the Long Beach Opera Company. Other artistic mentors include the late Randall Behr (former conductor and music director, Juilliard Opera Center, and former resident conductor, Los Angeles Music Center Opera), the late Michael Carson (conductor, Lake George Opera), and Menahem Pressler (Beaux Arts Trio).

Ms. Frank moved to Boston in 1991 to conduct at Harvard University; five years later she founded Boston Secession. She is currently the Minister of Worship and the Arts at First Congregational Church, Winchester. She spent 21 years as a Senior Resident Scholar at the Women's Studies Research Center at Brandeis University. From 2011-2022, Ms. Frank served as Artistic Director of the North Shore's Cantemus Chamber Chorus. She produced the late composer and fellow Brandeis Scholar Ruth Lomon's "Shadowing," a critically acclaimed recording of her piano works. She co-produced and co-edited three recordings with Laury Gutiérrez and her exhilarating early music fusion ensemble, Rumbarroco. From 2011-2017, she served as part-time resident guest conductor at the Gitameit Music Centre in Yangon, Myanmar.

Ms. Frank has conducted and produced two CDs with Boston Secession – "Afterlife: German Choral Meditation on Morality" and "Surprised by Beauty: Minimalism in Choral Music." Both CDs were outstandingly reviewed by the New York Times, Gramophone, and American Record Guide, along with many other journals, magazines, and blogs.

Daniel Goldsmith, Pianist

Daniel Goldsmith is a Boston-based pianist, educator, conductor, and music director. As a versatile musician with decades of experience, Daniel is equally comfortable performing in symphony halls and jazz clubs, whether behind a keyboard or with a baton in his hands. Formerly based in California, Daniel has enjoyed a vibrant career as a freelance pianist and has served as music direc-



tor for Cabrillo Stage and the Santa Cruz Actors' Theatre in numerous productions including *Company, Into the Woods, The Producers*, and *La Cage Aux Folles*. Daniel is a founding member and conductor of The Santa Cruz Opera Project, an organization whose goal is to bring high quality, accessible, and free opera performances to the residents of Santa Cruz County. He was previously a long-standing member of the Santa Cruz/San Francisco Bay Area Hip Hop Fusion band, Nobody's Own, and served as keyboardist and co-producer on their debut album Freak Show.

Daniel holds a BM in Piano Performance from the University of the Pacific, where he studied under Professor Frank Wiens and Dr. Rex Cooper. He is currently pursuing a MM in Collaborative Piano at the Boston Conservatory at Berklee.





Carrie Kouroumelis, Harp

Nationally noted harpist Carrie Kourkoumelis began her career in Seattle, where she won the coveted Battelle Prize that included a debut recital. She studied at The Curtis Institute of Music, the University of Washington, the Music Academy of the West, and was awarded a Leonard Bernstein Fellowship at Tanglewood. She has held principal harp positions in New England, Washington, Montana, California, and Alaska. Her free-lance work has included solo or principal roles in the Los Angeles film studios, Boston Cecilia Society, Master Singers, Alea III, Boston Lyric Opera, Boston Ballet Orchestra, Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra, New Hampshire Symphony, Monadnock Music Festival, Springfield Symphony, and for many Broadway theater productions. She also has played at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Sanders Theater, the Gardner Museum, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the J. Paul Getty Museum. Currently, she serves as president of the American Harp Foundation. Carrie is presently the Director of The Classic Harps of New England and teaches primarily in her Melrose studio

John Soults, Cello

Mr. John Soults is an active freelance cellist in New England. He is principal cellist for The Claflin Hill Symphony Orchestra and was the principal cellist of the Utica Symphony Orchestra. He has played with Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra of Boston, Huntington Theatre, North Shore Music Theater, Gloucester Stage, Boston Cecilia, Boston Center for the Arts, The Worcester Chorus, Symphony New Hampshire, New Bedford Orchestra, and other Boston, Worcester, and Cape Cod area orchestras and choirs. He is an active chamber musician, having performed live on WGBH public Radio, and is a cello teacher in and around the Boston area.

Beth Welty, Violin

Beth Welty received her bachelor's and master's degree in violin performance from Indiana University. She has performed with numerous groups in the Boston area, including the Bach, Beethoven, and Brahams Society, the Handel and Hadyn Society, and the Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra. She has performed abroad with various organizations touring Italy, England, Spain, and Switzerland. Beth has served as concert master of the Nashua Chamber Orchestra since 2005. She maintains a private teaching studio in her home in Waltham and is a teacher at the Upbeat NH Strings program in Nashua, NH.
